





Gender and Dementia Care; Aspects in Family Caring

Policy & Practice Forum (Hosted by Dementia Research Network Ireland & The National Dementia Office)

It is estimated that there are currently 64,000 people living with dementia in Ireland and approximately 180,000 family carers supporting them. Family carers can experience a myriad of challenges including social isolation and loneliness, mental health difficulties and negative physical health effects¹. Family carers, who are more often women, are also more likely than the general population to live in poverty, with many family carers experiencing a sharp decrease in their earning ability.

Due to the feminisation of caring, as well as the lack of status and recognition for caring activities, this has resulted in many male family carers experiencing stigma, which can lead to a reluctance to ask for or accept help¹. For minority groups, such as carers from the LGBTQI+ community, these effects are likely to be compounded by other issues connected with their minority status which they may have been experiencing before the onset of caring responsibilities.

This forum aims to raise awareness of inequity regarding female carers as well as the lack of visibility, research and supports for male carers and carers from the LGBTQI+ community. There will be a panel discussion to explore issues around the LGBTQI+ community and dementia care.
